Keynote Presenters Creating More Livable Communities for People of All Ages: Climate Impact, Resilience & Restoration



Keynote Presenter, Danielle Arigoni Author, Climate Resilience For An Aging Nation Topic: Why Older Adults Should Be the Lens through Which We Plan for Climate Change. **Danielle Arigoni is the author of Climate Resilience for an Aging Nation.** Danielle Arigoni is an urban planner and community resilience expert. She currently serves as Managing Director for Policy and Solutions at National Housing Trust, where she provides strategic direction for the organization's sustainability and resilience policy efforts, and oversight and guidance for NHT's state and local advisory services. She is also author of *Climate Resilience for an Aging Nation* which explores the impacts of climate change on a rapidly growing demographic – people over 65 – and the need for community-scale solutions to reduce risk for all.



Keynote Presenter, Dr. Leo Bachinger Program Manager, NYSDEC Office of Climate Change Topic: Climate Impacts on Vulnerable Communities **Dr. Leo Bachinger is the Program Manager at NYSDEC Office of Climate Change.** Dr. Bachinger also co-leads the State's extreme heat adaptation planning initiatives. Before joining DEC, he advised governments and local communities in Europe and the US on advancing equitable and community-led policy solutions to climate change.

Greg Olsen is the Acting Director of New York State Office for the Aging. Working with public and private partners at the state and local level, Greg is leading the effort to combat ageism, generalizations, and stereotypes about what aging is and demonstrating value in addressing social determinants of health and their role in helping older adults maintain their independence with dignity. Greg speaks regularly, across the nation, about how New York frames aging, and the way New York serves older New Yorkers.

COMMUNITY IMPACT

For the period July 1, 2023 – present, 84 Mercy Care Volunteers provided friendship and assistance to 129 Elders in our Tri-Lakes communities where they donated 2,644 hours of service, drove 16,250 miles, and completed 1,561 requests for assistance.

AGE-FRIENDLY COMMUNITIES MISSION EXTENSION INITIATIVE

Mercy Care has received significant grant support from the Mother Cabrini Health Foundation to extend the successful model of its Age-friendly Communities Initiative in the Tri-Lakes region to other communities in the North Country. Mercy Care has signed Memoranda of Understanding with the Community Health Center of the North Country, a Federally Qualified Health Center in St. Lawrence County; with Elizabethtown Community Hospital, a critical access hospital, and its health centers in southern Essex County; St. Alexander's Church in Clinton County; with the Greater Massena Ministerial Association in St. Lawrence County; and most recently with St. Mary's Church in Ticonderoga. Mercy Care provides technical assistance, training, and tools to help each of our Mission Extension project partners establish and operate their own Age-friendly Community Initiatives.

PARISH NURSE PROGRAM

Mercy Care has trained more than 50 Parish Nurses throughout the North Country. Lexi Bevilacqua, Program Director, directs Mercy Care's Parish Nurse Program in coordination with Parish Nurse Educator Consultant, Jane Stratton, MS, RN, NPD-BC. Parish Nurses are licensed registered nurses who facilitate holistic health of body, mind, and spirit. They promote health and spiritual healing. They serve as health educators, advocates, health counselors, facilitators, and spiritual caregivers. Parish Nurses do not perform direct or hands-on care, and they do not duplicate other nursing or medical services in the community.

From a Parish Nurse: "Parish Nursing frees me to be the nurse I always envisioned – it allows me to use my years of experience and the gift of God's grace to support others. It is...personal care, holistic care, community care, impactful care – it is Mercy Care!"

As part of its Age-friendly Communities Initiative, Mercy Care has launched its newly created Age-friendly Education Network in the Adirondacks. We provide in-service and education programs to Volunteers and host workshops to inspire Creativity in Aging for Volunteers to help the Elders they assist have happier and fuller lives. We invite and include our Mission Extension collaborating partners and their Volunteers and Elder Friends in the network to share knowledge, experience, and mercy.

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
