Christmas Cookie Favorites

Christmas Corn Flake Wreaths

1/2 c. butter or margerine
35 LARGE marshmallows
1 tsp. vanilla
1 1/2 tsp. green food coloring
4 c. corn flakes

Stir butter and marshmallows until melted. Add vanilla and coloring, then flakes.

Drop by heaping teaspoons onto buttered wax paper covered cookie sheet. Wiggle your finger in the center of each to shape like a wreath and decorate with cinnamon red hot candies. Store at room temperature. Cover with wax paper.

Coconut Christmas Trees

Darlene's Mom's (Ronnie Blanton) Favorite

2 c. sifted confectioners' sugar 1/2 c. soft butter 1/4 c. light cream (I use evaporated milk) 1 tsp vanilla 3 c. flaked coconut

Blend all ingredients with a mixer until creamed.

Put in refrigerator until well chilled. Drop by rounded teaspoon onto wax paper covered cookie sheet. Refrigerate at least a half hour. Remove from fridge and shape each into a little cone that looks like a baby white Christmas tree.

Sprinkle Baker's Corner Green Sugar crystals on a piece of wax paper. Roll each cone in crystals until covered and green. Keep in an airtight container in the refrigerator. They are quick to make and always a holiday favorite!
